Tubulopathies Teaching Session Evaluation Report

October 2022

The Scottish Paediatric Renal Urology Network (SPRUN) hosted a Tubulopathies Teaching Session on Monday 31st October 2022. Results from the evaluation are as follows.

There were 19 delegates in attendance. Evaluations were received from 10 attendees giving a response rate of 53%.

Figure 1 - Designations and Figure 2 - Health Boards below show the designations and Health Boards of respondents.






Figure 2 - Health Boards




The aim of this event was to provide up to date education/information for professionals who care for children with renal and/or urology related healthcare needs. Attendees were asked if this objective had been met and to also rate the presentations.

Additional Benefits

Participants were asked what they had gained as a result of attending this event. The consensus was that the event had provided a lot of useful information which had improved awareness and understanding of tubular conditions and management of them.


A few quotes are noted below:

Practice Influenced or Consolidated

Participants were asked if their practice had been influenced or consolidated by attending the event. 70% of respondents indicated that their practice was either influenced or consolidated as a result of attending this event as indicated in Figure 5 - Practice Influenced or Consolidated.



Participants were asked how their practice would change as a result of attending this event. Points are as noted as below:

Summary & Conclusion

There were 19 delegates who attended. 10 responses were received to the evaluation giving a response rate of 53%. 90% of respondents indicated that the overall objective of providing up to date education/information had been met with 10% remaining neutral. Between 80% - 100% of respondents also found each of the presentations (including case presentations) either highly or mostly beneficial. 10% of respondents remained neutral on benefits of Homeostasis and Cases Study presentations. Only 10% of respondents found the case studies not at all beneficial. The feedback is evidence that the education sessions

continue to meet the needs of the vast majority of the renal community and the objective to cover the renal curriculum for staff.

Increased knowledge, awareness and improvement of patient management were the main themes around benefits of attending this event and changes to practice.

Overall, the event was a great success. SPRUN continues to review all feedback to explore how it can be utilised to shape and further improve future events.
